Kiwi

The Kiwi is New Zealand's flightless, native bird (flightless means that it cannot fly.) Sadly, they are endangered, so there are only 68,000 kiwi left in the world.

Appearance

The kiwi has brown, bristly feathers, like hair, all over its body. It has long bristles around its bill to navigate in the dark. Its beak is a yellowy colour with nostrils at the end of its beak. Kiwi have muscular legs that make up a third of its body weight. WOW!!

Habitat

Kiwi are found in the North Island in forests and live in burrows or a hole in a tree. They like to hang out near trees, rivers and wetland vegetation. They love dark environments and a quiet space.

Diet

Kiwi have an interesting diet. They eat bugs, crayfish, eels, tuna, and worms. They don't just eat meat. They also eat berries, seeds, and some leaves. Their predators are foxes, dogs, cats, and possums. Make sure to keep kiwi away from its predators.

In summary New Zealand's native bird, the kiwi, is endangered so help them to not become extinct. It would be so unfortunate if the kiwi were to be extinct.
