Tēnā koutou katoa,

Welcome back to term 4 and our online learning programme while we are currently not allowed to have all students back at school. We currently have three bubble classes running at school which is one more than the last term. This has meant that more staff and learning support staff are back onsite helping with these bubble classrooms. It has been great to see so many students back online again engaged with the learning that is being provided and thank you to all whānau who are supporting students interacting with these lessons and the learning provided.

In regards to the current communication from the Ministry please note the following:

- Our staff on-site will also have been tested for COVID-19 before they get back to
 work and we are moving toward having 100 percent of our staff vaccinated so
 we are all playing our part in keeping our community safe.
- You can also assist everyone's safety by keeping your child at home if they are feeling unwell and please do contact your GP or Healthline, to seek advice about getting tested.
- It is now legally required that we hold a COVID-19 vaccination register for all eligible students and staff.
- If we were to have a case of COVID-19 in our school, public health authorities will want to know if we are a school with a high vaccination rate. This information will then be used as part of the local health authority's risk assessment. The more highly vaccinated we are (staff and eligible students), the less likely it will be that we will have to close down for a long period of time, or we might not need to close at all.

Thank you for your continued support and we look forward to working with you to help our tamariki develop and grow over the coming weeks.

In preparation for our full return to school [date TBA]:

Vaccinations are mandatory for all those working on-site including teachers, relief teachers, casual staff, administration staff, caretakers, cleaners, OSCAR providers and hostel staff — whether direct employees or employees of a contractor. It also applies to unpaid workers, such as volunteers (including parent volunteers) and any members of the community who are on-site at the school kura, as they are likely to come into contact with students. Please be prepared to be asked about your vaccine status and not offended when and if we do.

The vaccination requirement does not apply to parents or whānau undertaking student pick-ups and drop-offs, but these should be conducted in an outdoor environment where face coverings must be worn, and physical distancing measures retained. Parents and caregivers will not be permitted in classrooms.

These are the very best things we can do to keep our community as safe as possible and get everyone back to school.

Camp 2021:

Edendale staff have been working really hard to enable the camp to go ahead this year. We were hoping that there was a possibility that we would make it back to Level 1 by December, but this no longer seems likely.

Due to the current Covid environment and ever-growing case numbers, we have decided it's best to call off the camp this year. We understand that this will be very difficult news for some students and whānau, especially our year 6 tamariki who will be moving to Intermediate next year. We are sorry that we could not make this happen for you, we tried our best.

We really appreciated the support from the community in getting payments in for camp, parents volunteering to help at camp, and even taking leave from work and undertaking police vetting to help make this happen. Thank you

Teacher Only Day Update: PLEASE NOTE CHANGE:

Having cancelled the teacher only days this term so that we could continue to provide ongoing, uninterrupted online lessons for your students we have had to move these to next year. We have moved one of the teacher only days to the 1st of February 2022. This means the start date for school next year will be 2nd February. We are currently thinking about when it is best for the second teacher only day and we are currently thinking the 2nd of June 2022 (TBC).



Welcome to our first newsletter for term 4.





Room 3 has been learning about electricity and picking up where we left off in our reading, writing and maths. It has been great to see everyone back and engaging with their learning.






Welcome back, Atawhai, Term 4




Room10 has been busy learning about 'Precious Power'. We are learning about renewable energy and how to save energy at home.




